COURSE OVERVIEW

This is a streamlined course designed for students at the beginner level of Vietnamese. Course topics and vocabulary are carefully compiled to provide students with the language patterns that will enable students to engage in simple daily conversations as well as to read and write short paragraphs. Some basic aspects of Vietnamese culture will also be introduced.

Throughout the course, the methodology of the communicative approach is used to ensure that students will obtain a high level of linguistic and communicative competence. **Vietnamese is the language of instruction so questions and concerns that require using English are given after class time and during office hours.**

DELIVERY

The class will also be conducted in person. The course meets Monday through Friday from 08:00AM to 12:00PM in [REDACTED].

Presentational communication (speaking and writing):

- communicate information, make presentations, and express thoughts about familiar topics, using sentences and series of connected sentences through spoken and written language.
- tell stories about school and community events and personal experiences, using a few short paragraphs, often across various time frames.

- state their viewpoint on familiar or researched topics and provide reasons to support it, using a few short paragraphs, often across various time frames.
- give detailed presentations on a variety of familiar topics and some concrete topics they have researched, using a few short paragraphs, often across various time frames.

Interpretive communication (listening and reading):

- understand main ideas and some pieces of information on familiar topics from sentences and series of connected sentences within texts that are spoken or written
- usually follow main messages in straightforward, and sometimes descriptive, paragraph-length informational texts.
- usually follow the main story and actions expressed in paragraph-length fictional texts
- usually understand the main ideas and flow of events expressed in conversations and discussions.

COURSE POLICIES

- **Linguistic performance:** The linguistic performance in class grade (10%) will be reduced for not fully participating in class activities or skipping a class activity. The performance is graded in each class based on the following criteria

- Homework:** Homework will be exercises in the textbook, pre-class and post-class assignments. Homework and assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. Hand-written or typed are acceptable, but file formats should be **Word, Pdf, or Jpg**. The homework grade will be reduced by 5% for 24-hours late submission and **3 days** late submission will not be accepted.
- Quizzes:** There are 6 quizzes in **1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 6th, and 7th** week. Each quiz is 15-30 minutes covering what was taught up to the date that is before the quiz date.
- Final exams:** There are 2 final exams in the **4th and 8th** week. Each exam includes a written exam and a 20–30-minute oral interview in OPI format with the teacher(s)
- Task based projects and journal:** There are two task-based projects and six journals in total. Please see the project & journal guidelines for more information.

If you are not part of IFLI and are interested in developing your own language portfolio, please meet with the Vietnamese language coordinator, Hong Dinh, during her office hours.
